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A Message from the Headteacher



Firstly, I would just like to take this opportunity to congratulate all of the Year 6 children this week who have been sitting their SATs tests. Everyone has really tried their best and that is

all that we ask for. Thank you also to the rest of the school for adapting to changes and for keeping noise to a minimum during each morning.

It has been lovely having such good weather this term and seeing so many of our classes taking their learning outside to make use of the fantastic grounds we have - long may it continue! With this in mind, please can you ensure your child is coming to school each day with a water bottle, hat and having already applied sun cream to ensure they are safe outside during break times and in any outdoor lessons. Please also check your child regularly for 'Ticks' (most tick bites are harmless but they can carry Lyme disease and other infections). It is especially worth checking in areas like the scalp, behind the ears, around the neck, and under arms.

Looking ahead to next term, we look forward to welcoming parents to our sports days and our summer fayre-please see the dates and times below. Please note that the sports day dates are provisional and are weather dependent-if we have to cancel due to weather conditions we will let you know as soon as possible but this could be on the morning, depending on how the field is looking.

The term, 'good boy' is being used in a condescending way to demean their classmates and/or staff. Health and Safety/Online Safety

Top Tips for Parents (Ages 4–11)

1. Start Early and Talk Often

- Begin conversations about online safety as soon as your child starts using devices.
- Use age-appropriate language and keep the dialogue open and non-judgmental.

• Ask questions like: "What games do you like?" or "Who do you talk to online?"

2. Use Parental Controls

- Set up safe search filters, screen time limits, and age-appropriate content restrictions on devices and apps.
- Use built-in tools from Apple, Android, and Microsoft to manage access and monitor usage.

3. Know the Apps and Games

- Familiarise yourself with the platforms your child uses. London Grid for Learning offers a "What's That App?" section to help decode popular apps.
- Check age ratings and privacy settings.

4. Balance Screen Time

- Encourage a healthy balance between screen time and offline activities.
- Use screen time as a reward or part of a routine, and model good habits yourself.

5. Teach Critical Thinking

- Help children understand that not everything online is true.
- Discuss topics like fake news, online advertising, and the importance of privacy.

6. Encourage Safe Sharing

- Teach children not to share personal information (like their full name, school, or address) online.
- Explain the risks of sharing photos or videos.

7. Report and Block

- Show children how to block users and report inappropriate content.
- Reassure them that they can come to you if something online makes them uncomfortable.

8. Stay Involved

- Keep devices in shared family spaces.
- Play games and explore apps together to understand your child's digital world.

Penalty Notices

- If a child has at least 10 (10 or more) sessions of unauthorised absence in 10 school weeks, their parent/carer(s) may receive a penalty notice (a morning or afternoon is one session; a whole school day is two sessions.)
- The first time a penalty is issued within a three-year rolling period, it is £80 (per parent/carer, per child) payable within 21 days, rising to £160 if paid between 22 and 28 days. (If the fine is not paid, the parent/carer may be prosecuted for the child's unauthorised absence.
- The second time a penalty notice is issued to the same parent/carer for the same child the amount will be £160 per parent/carer, per child (if paid within 28 days). There is no reduction in the amount if the penalty is paid early. (Again, if the fine is not paid, the parent/carer may be prosecuted.)

• Fines per parent/carer will be capped to two fines within any 3-year period. Once this limit has been reached, a prosecution will be considered. Prosecution may result in fines of up to £2,500 per parent/carer, per child.

EYFS



Admiral

The children in Admiral nursery have been very busy learning about seeds and plants. We discovered through song what a seed needs to help it grow and learned the names of some parts of a plant - stem, leaves, roots, bud and flower. We are going to plant our own sunflowers and cut open some fruits and vegetables to find their seeds. We created water colour flowers using cotton pads and pipettes, inspired by our artist of the term Georgia O'Keeffe. Our new children continue to settle in well and are now doing their full hours.

Mary-Rose Pre-School

We have had a lovely couple of weeks in Pre-School, making the most of the gorgeous sunshine. We have done lots of planting in our new gardening area, including cress heads and sunflower seeds, and we can't wait to see these keep growing and growing.

We also had some new pet caterpillars come to stay in Mary-Rose and the children have loved watching them slowly grow bigger and bigger, and we are so excited to see them turn into beautiful butterflies.

We have been learning about the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and have learnt some great knowledge of the lifecycle of a butterfly, and have done lots of activities about this, including making symmetry butterflies and repeating pattern caterpillars.

Reception

We can't believe it's nearly the end of term already! Reception have continued exploring the fascinating world of plants, flowers, and minibeasts through a range of hands-on, crosscurricular activities. We began by planting seeds and observing how water, sunlight, and soil help plants grow, learning key vocabulary such as "roots," "stem," "leaves," and "petals." The children also enjoyed investigating different types of flowers, identifying their parts, and using magnifying glasses to look closely at their details. As part of their learning about life cycles, the children explored the life cycles of other minibeasts like ladybirds and frogs through stories, songs, and sequencing activities. We have been out in the Meadow together! This outdoor learning allowed our children to see bugs in their natural habitat, fostering curiosity and showing respect for living things. Through art, role play, and storytelling, the children expressed their learning in creative and meaningful ways.





Year 1


Year 1 have been doubling and halving in Maths. We know that we need 2 equal groups to make half. We are looking forward to learning about quarters next week.

In Science, we have been looking at plants. We looked at plants around the school and the different types of trees we have. We know that evergreen trees stay green all year and have thin needle like leaves and deciduous trees have large, flat leaves that fall off in the autumn.

Year 2

This week, Year 2 engaged in an exciting circuit training session. They hopped over hurdles like energetic kangaroos, raced friends with the speed of cheetahs, performed tuck rolls like nimble beetles, and balanced, jumped, and rolled on beams with the agility of monkeys. It was a fun and dynamic gymnastics experience!

We've also been getting our hands messy and our imaginations buzzing as we created our very own clay bugs in Art! From wriggly worms to spotty ladybirds and stripy bees, the classroom has been crawling with creativity. This fun project linked perfectly with our Science topic, where we've been learning all about insects and their amazing features. The children loved shaping, squashing, and decorating their bugs—some even gave their names and little backstories! It's been a brilliant way to mix science with art, and we've all had a blast bringing our minibeast knowledge to life in such a hands-on way.
















LKS2



Year 3

Year 3 have been building upon their learning of famous explorers between 1400-1600 by finding out about why some consider Sir Francis Drake to be a hero whereas others consider him to be a pirate. In maths, they have furthered their understanding of time and are beginning to tell the time to the nearest minute on both analogue and digital clocks. In science, they completed their cress growing experiment and were surprised to discover that cress grew tallest in the dark; however, it wasn't a healthy plant. In art, they created their own stamp using cardboard squares and matchsticks and used these to create their own artwork.

Year 4

Year 4 have been working really hard in computing this term. They have been learning to code on microbits and have even made a game of 'rock, paper, scissors'. They have also enjoyed learning about the history of art and are enjoying making their final piece in their painting unit. Also, Year 4 have enjoyed using powerful description in their writing this week to describe settings and characters. In swimming, all of the children have made huge progress and have built confidence in the water.

In English, they have been mystery novel writers as well as investigative journalists, as they wrote narratives and newspaper reports about some strange happenings in Waycroft. They've also continued with their fantastic orienteering and cricket work in PE, practising reading and marking maps and having 'mini matches' in the sunshine. Great work year 5!

We are so proud of them and how well they have approached their SATs this week. In PE, the children have been practising their gym skills, working incredibly hard with the external gym coaches.











































HOW TO MEASURE YOUR CHILD





HEIGHT: Without shoes, with the back against the wall place feet together flat on the floor. Measure from the top of the head to the ground.



NECK: Measure around the base of the neck where the shirt collar would normally sit. Leave a little room for comfort.

CHEST: Measure the chest at the fullest part placing the tape close up under the arms.

WAIST: Measure around the natural waistline, at the narrowest part. Leave a little extra room for comfort.



HIPS: Standing straight, with heels together, measure around the fullest part.

INSIDE LEG: In bare feet take the measurement from the top of the inside leg to on or just below your ankle joint, where the trousers would naturally finish.


