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A Message from the Headteacher



Welcome back to Term 5. We have had a great start to the term, aided by some lovely weather! The children have really enjoyed being back on the grass at playtimes and KS2 have really benefitted from the Quidditch training over the past few days, along with the house tournament they have played this afternoon. If you are wondering how the game is played then please ask your child as I have no idea what the rules are!

Linked to the great weather/outdoors, you may have seen (facebook) that I shared a book called, 'Unplugged' with the children in Monday's assembly. Talking to many of our children, it is clear how much they love playing outside, as well as being on a screen...they just need reminders of this from time to time, along with some help in trying to get a good balance. I have previously mentioned that our staff are trying to ensure they share a greater number and variety of books at Waycroft, to promote a love of reading, language and imagination etc. I previously mentioned the money raised through the travelling book fayre; below you will see the books that Mrs Kelson was able to purchase with the commission we received. Thank you for supporting this...the children are already really enjoying some of these from our library.

Whilst the children love being on the field, I am aware that hayfever can make life a little challenging at times. If you have a child who does struggle with this, then please make sure they have a dose of Piriton etc before coming to school. Our staff will not administer any hayfever medication during the school day, unless the medication and timings are specifically directed by a GP. The guidelines for taking Piriton is 5ml every 4-6 hours...so a spoonful before school should cover the majority of the school day, especially the times when the children are on the field.

A message to Year 6 pupils-As you approach your SATs, I want to express my sincere pride in all the hard work you've put in this year. We've seen you grow and learn, and you should be feeling confident about what you have achieved. Remember, these tests are just a snapshot, a measure of your current knowledge, and they don't define you as a person. Your teachers know you well, and we have all seen your talents and skills extend far beyond the curriculum. You are all unique and valuable, with your own strengths and passions. So, as you take these tests, remember to focus on doing your best...do not let them worry you and think of them as a way to show what you are able to do. You have prepared well, and you have everything you need to succeed!

Health and Safety/Uniform reminder



As the weather is getting warmer, we would just like to take this opportunity to remind you of our uniform expectations.

Our uniform is:

- Royal blue school cardigan, sweatshirt or fleece (with or without logo)
- White shirt or polo shirt

• Grey or black trousers/shorts/skirt. Not tight-fitting leggings or lycra style trousers or shorts.

- Grey or black pinafore dress
- Royal blue summer gingham dress
- White, black or grey socks or tights

• Plain black flat shoes. This can be plain black trainers, as long as there are no other colours/markings e.g. white stripes, Nike tick etc. Please ensure that footwear is easy to fasten i.e. no children should be wearing laces unless they can confidently tie them.

Please note: Children should not be in any type of sandals where their feet are exposed.

For PE, all children need to wear the following on the days they have PE

- Plain white t-shirt, with or without the logo
- Black shorts or joggers; not tight-fitting leggings or lycra style trousers or shorts.
- Their blue school jumper or cardigan
- A pair of trainers

Please can you ensure that sun cream is applied prior to coming into school, children have a hat when it is warm and that they have a refillable water bottle each day.

Penalty Notices

- If a child has at least 10 (10 or more) sessions of unauthorised absence in 10 school weeks, their parent/carer(s) may receive a penalty notice (a morning or afternoon is one session; a whole school day is two sessions.)
- The first time a penalty is issued within a three-year rolling period, it is £80 (per parent/carer, per child) payable within 21 days, rising to £160 if paid between 22 and 28 days. (If the fine is not paid, the parent/carer may be prosecuted for the child's unauthorised absence.
- The second time a penalty notice is issued to the same parent/carer for the same child the amount will be £160 per parent/carer, per child (if paid within 28 days). There is no reduction in the amount if the penalty is paid early. (Again, if the fine is not paid, the parent/carer may be prosecuted.)

• Fines per parent/carer will be capped to two fines within any 3-year period. Once this limit has been reached, a prosecution will be considered. Prosecution may result in fines of up to £2,500 per parent/carer, per child.

We have used different techniques to create our own spot and stripe artwork.

Mary-Rose Pre-School

What a wonderful start to Term 5 we have had! We have been learning all about Jack and The Beanstalk, and the children have enjoyed lots of activities related to this. We have been planting our own seeds, using our incredible imaginations to think about what we would love to see at the top of the beanstalk, retelling the story and using masks and puppets to role play. As the weather improves, we have also been making use of our amazing new gardening area.

Reception

Over the past few weeks, the Reception children have been learning all about growing and caring for plants. We started by reading *Errol's Garden*, which inspired us to plant our own seeds and begin our own mini gardens in the classroom and outdoor areas. The children

have been busy writing sentences about how to look after plants, learning that they need water, sunlight, and care to grow. In our maths activities, we've been counting petals and matching numerals to the correct quantities, helping to build our number skills in a fun and practical way. We have also been building numbers beyond 10 and using ten frames to show our understanding of ten plus one digit numbers! It's been a wonderful, hands-on topic so far!




























LKS2































UKS2







Achievement Assembly
