Health and Safety/Road Safety



Safety on Waycroft site

Please **do not allow** your child to ride their bike or scooter once through the school gates, including younger siblings. This is a very busy site and we need to ensure that everyone is safe.

Metal Straws

Please do not send any metal straws into school with your child's drink/water bottle. These can cause a nasty injury if children are to slip/fall onto one of these as they are nearly always sharp on the edges/ends.

Road safety

The THINK! 'Safe Adventures' campaign (launched in April 2024), aims to help parents across the country prepare their children for independent travel when they move to secondary school (and before for those who walk to school alone).

Road casualty data shows that the number of child **pedestrian casualties doubles between the ages of 9 and 11**, with incidents more likely to happen during drop-off and pick up times.

THINK! 'Safe Adventures' focuses in on the top 3 risky behaviours (based on the top contributory factors assigned to child pedestrian casualties):

- Pedestrian failure to look / distraction (friends and mobiles).
- Pedestrian careless, reckless or in a hurry.
- Safe place to cross (including parked cars and behind buses).

The campaign encourages parents to undertake practice journeys, always model best practice and to have a road safety conversation as part of their children's preparation for changing schools. For more information please visit:

Penalty Notices

- If a child has at least 10 (10 or more) sessions of unauthorised absence in 10 school weeks, their parent/carer(s) may receive a penalty notice (a morning or afternoon is one session; a whole school day is two sessions.)
- The first time a penalty is issued within a three-year rolling period, it is £80 (per parent/carer, per child) payable within 21 days, rising to £160 if paid between 22 and 28 days. (If the fine is not paid, the parent/carer may be prosecuted for the child's unauthorised absence.
- The second time a penalty notice is issued to the same parent/carer for the same child the amount will be £160 per parent/carer, per child (if paid within 28 days).

There is no reduction in the amount if the penalty is paid early. (Again, if the fine is not paid, the parent/carer may be prosecuted.)

 Fines per parent/carer will be capped to two fines within any 3-year period. Once this limit has been reached, a prosecution will be considered. Prosecution may result in fines of up to £2,500 per parent/carer, per child.

Year 1

Year 2 had a lot of fun exploring and creating their bracelets... they couldn't wait to show them off!










































LKS2



Year 3

Year 3 have shown remarkable resilience in their reading and grammar assessments this week. It was lovely showcase of the progress that they have made this year! In maths, 'accuracy' has been the word as they have been measuring and drawing lines. They noticed that the squares in their maths books are exactly 1cm long, which has allowed them to draw shapes to exact specifications. In geography, they have been introduced to lines of longtitude and latitude and located countries based upon their coordinates. They also discussed time zones and realised that countries experience different times based upon the location of the country.

Year 4

This week in Year 4, the children have shown amazing resilience whilst tackling their multiplication times table checks. They have also continued to develop their understanding of decimals. They have used map skills in geography to compare the landscapes of Peru and the South West of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland. The children enjoyed learning about the different biomes in Peru! Year 4 have continued their creative

writing and have produced exceptional narratives about a boy and his mysterious dream. In addition, they worked hard on their editing skills to improve their work.

Year 5

Year 5 have had a great first week back! We've been debating the advantages and disadvantages of being invaded by the Romans in History this week. The children enjoyed pretending to be Celtic chieftains deciding if they would join the empire or fight back! There was a lot of head scratching and discussions in RE as the children came up with their own moral dilemmas and discussed what they would do in some tricky situations when the right choice is not always so clear. In English, we have been discussing the themes of Shaun Tan's "The Arrival". This book has some amazing illustrations describing a strange new world that we will use as the basis for our own stories next week.

Year 6

Year 6 have had a fantastic first week back and have settled well into their final term at Waycroft. In English, the children have been inspired by the music video for "Titanium" and started writing their own narratives. They are focusing on using dialogue to develop their characters and move the stories along, which has been a fantastic way for them to enhance their writing skills. In maths, Year 6 have taken on the fun challenge of designing their own theme parks. They have been working within a budget and utilising their knowledge of area and perimeter to plan out their parks. They're also learning to calculate potential profits and losses using Excel, combining their maths skills with real-life applications. It's been wonderful to see their teamwork and ideas come together. In science, the children have been exploring how exercise affects pulse rate. Finally, in art, the pupils have been busy painting their superhero artworks. They're looking amazing already, and I can't wait to see the final products displayed!






































